



Massachusetts

- 99.6% of school districts are successfully serving healthy meals that meet strong nutrition standardsⁱ
- 26.6% of 10–17 year olds are overweight or obeseⁱⁱ
- 85% of school districts need at least one piece of equipment to better serve nutritious foodsⁱⁱⁱ
- 53% of districts need kitchen infrastructure changes in at least one school^{iv}
- 529,822 students participated in school lunch program in 2017^v
- 204,475 students participated in school breakfast program in 2017^{vi}
- In 2017 for 9th through 12th grades, 12.9% did not eat breakfast^{vii}
- In 2017 for 9th through 12th grades, 6.9% did not eat vegetables^{viii}
- For school year 2016–2017, 36.9% of eligible school districts and 60.7% of eligible schools adopted the Community Eligibility Program^{ix}
