Utilizing social needs assessments are a tool that may be implemented to capture information not otherwise detected through conventional medical assessments or procedures. These data can help inform a provider on the best treatment and resources to support a patient in their healing and long-term care.

There are a variety of well-tested social needs assessment tools available for hospitals that cover multiple domains: housing, transportation, nutrition, education, finance, and mental and social support are a few of them. Assessing patient needs in the community is a great first step that a site can do, but the impact is greatest when help and resources are provided for those patients with unmet needs. This is a list of widely used tools and resources by many Get With The Guidelines® (GWTG) hospitals and other national stakeholders looking to understand the impact of social drivers of health on their communities and develop solutions for sustainable improvement.

AHC Health-Related Social Needs (HRSN) Screening Tool: Tool developed by Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) & Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation (CMMI) and widely used by GWTG hospitals.

NCQA Social Determinants of Health Resource Guide: Describes strategies used by health plans and clinically integrated networks (CIN) to address SDOH.
